Dear Mayor Keys:

The 1998 Annual Report of the Elyria Police Department is respectfully submitted for your review. This year's report is based strictly on the NIBRS format for reporting crime data. It contains no Uniform Crime Report defined data.

1998 was a year of continued change within the Elyria Police Department. The move was made into the new building at 18 West Avenue and the full-service jail facility was opened and became fully functional.

In 1998 the Elyria Police Department completed its implementation of a completely computerized records system. All police reports are now entered into the computer data base by the investigating officer.

In order to review the quality of service being provided to the community, a program was started during 1998 that called for the random sampling of people who had had contact with members of the department to assess the level of service that they had received. 98% of the citizens contacted indicated that they were satisfied with the job that the department's employees were doing.

In order to increase community involvement with the department, the Elyria Police Auxiliary was brought back under the control of the department. 20 auxiliary officers now routinely volunteer their time and effort to the community and the department.

Serious crimes in the City of Elyria increased by 11.99% in 1998 over the previous year. The most significant increases came in abductions, simple assaults, rapes and other sex offenses. The vast majority of these sex offenses were either family related or the offender was known to the victim. The increase may have been due to better reporting, in part due to increased media attention on this type of crime in 1998.

During 1998 overall criminal arrests showed a slight increase (up by 3.57%). During this time, the number of warrants received from the Elyria Municipal Court increased from 1875 in 1997 to 2190 in 1998 (a 16.8% increase).

The total called-for-services in 1998 were 38,436, an increase of about 6.48%. The report statistics indicate that the members of the Elyria Police Department, through the resources allotted by the citizens of the City of Elyria, continue to have to a positive effect upon the community. 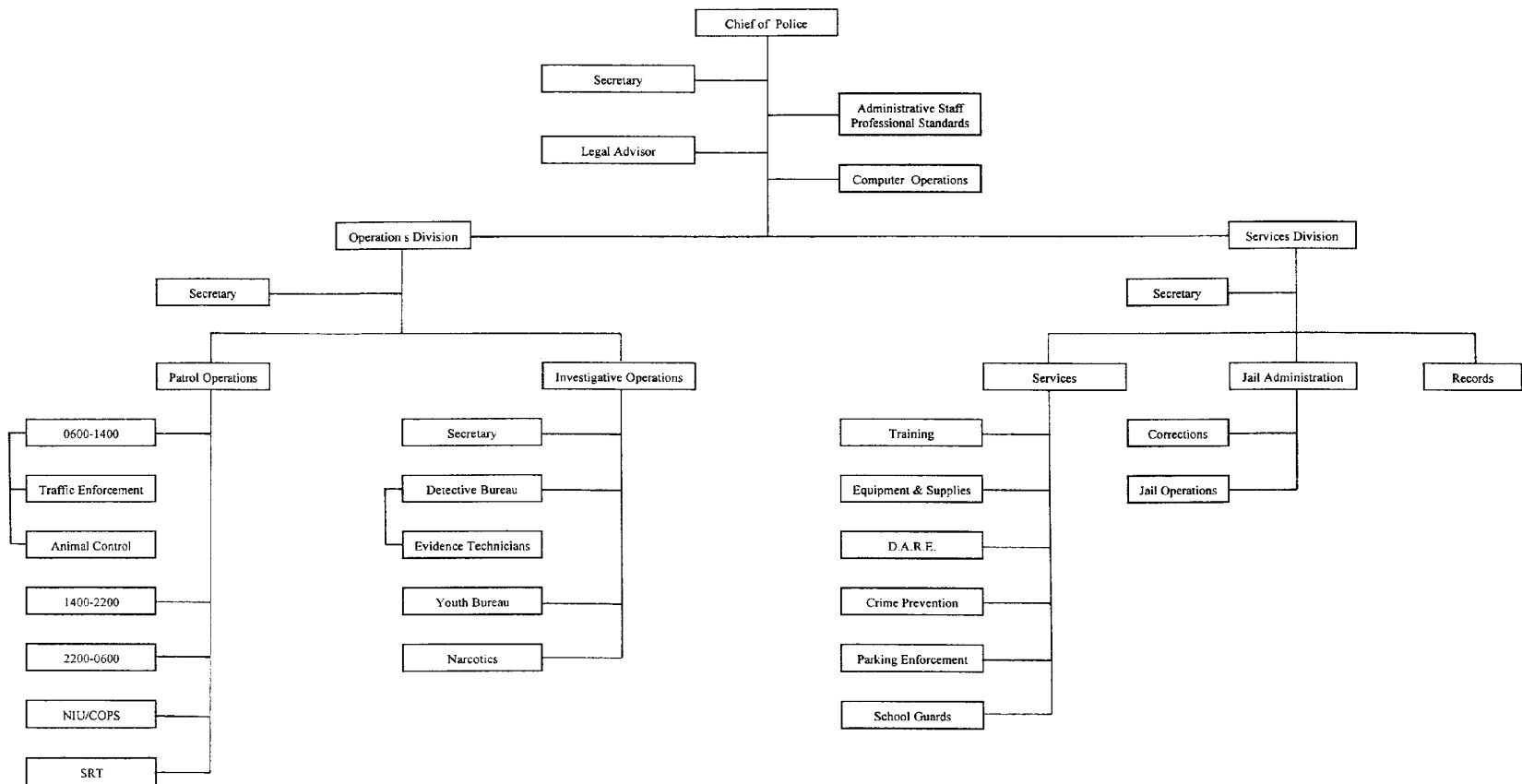
1998 Distribution of Sworn Personnel

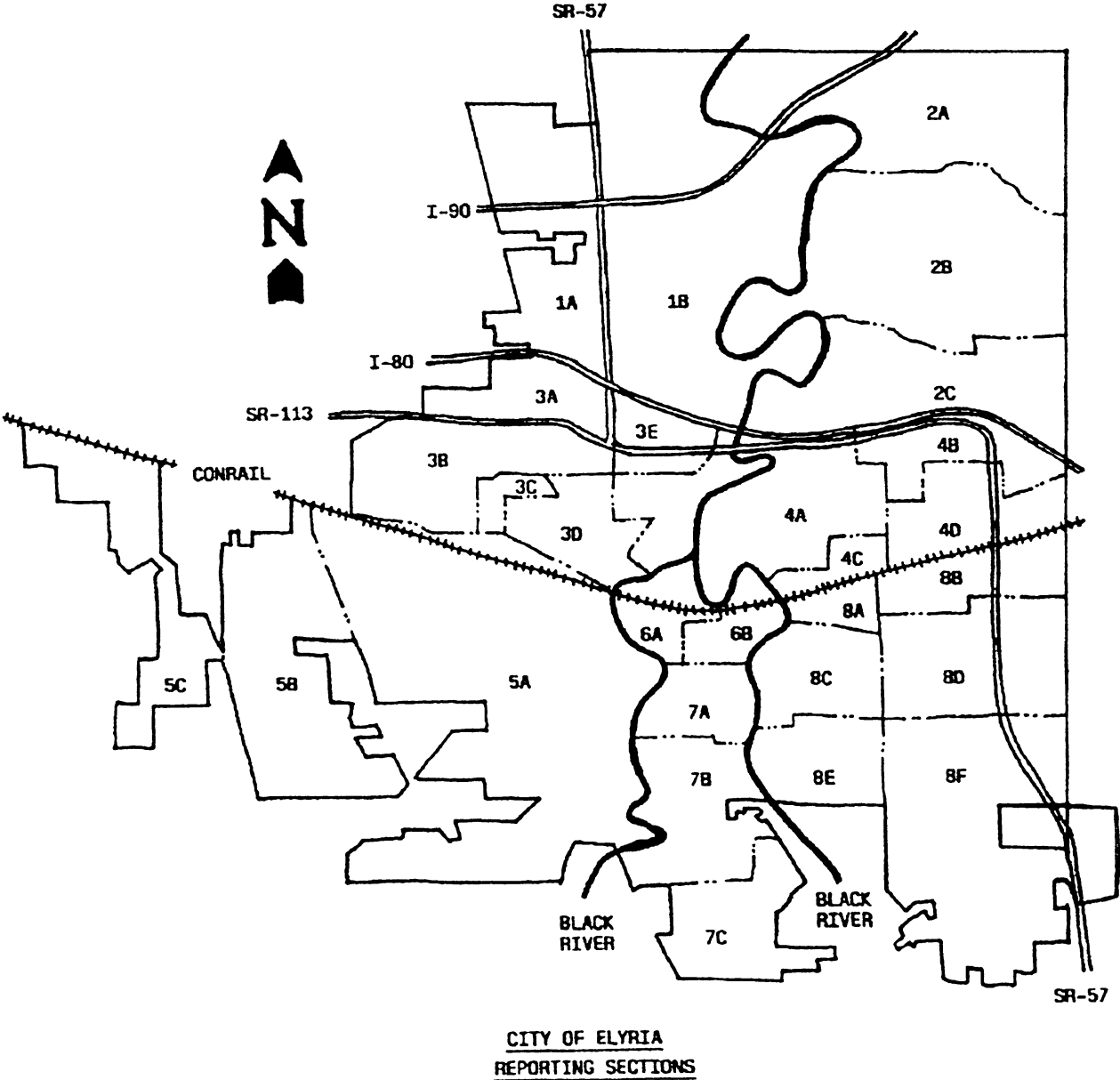

Services - Jail Operations

The Elyria City Jail initiated operations on May 6, 1998. On this date twenty-four prisoners who were being housed for the City of Elyria at the Seneca County Jail were transferred back to the city's new jail facility. Since that day the jail has processed 2,373 prisoners. The average length of stay in the facility is 84 hours with an average daily population of 43 prisoners. Our inmate population is comprised of 86% of the inmates being unsentenced and 14% serving a sentence.

The City Jail is staffed with 14 full time and two part time employees and is operational 24 hours a day 365 days a year. The corrections staff have all attended the state certified 120 hours corrections training course and have also attended 160 hours of in-house training in preparation for opening the jail facility. These officers were selected from nearly 500 applicants and were screened through the use of video testing, psychological testing, voice stress analysis testing, thorough background investigations and oral interviews. We feel the selection process was very successful due to the fact the jail division has only lost one part time officer during the 1st eight months.

In addition to the paid staff, the jail division makes use of the JOBS program provided by the Lorain County Human Services. With this program we are assigned one individual who works as a volunteer 129 hours a month in order to maintain their benefits. This individual has assisted in inmate services easing some of the burden from the security staff. This program started in May of 1998 and a total of 774 hours of volunteer time has been provided at year end.

The Elyria City Jail is a 48 bed facility and houses only male prisoners who are primarily misdemeanor offenders. The management philosophy is one that inmates are required to be responsible for their actions and depending on their behavioral choices can experience positive or negative responses. The inmates are required to wake up every morning at 7:00 am and make their beds and clean their cells. After breakfast, all inmates are required to clean the common areas of their housing units. No privileges such as television, newspapers or telephones are given to the inmates if these tasks are not completed and pass an officer's inspection. Inmates who adhere to the inmate rules are permitted to participate in programs such as G.E.D., AA, alcohol and drug awareness and prevention, religious and bible study programming. The inmate programming has been successful with one inmate obtaining his G.E.D. after release and two others who are prepared for the G.E.D. testing after their release. The religious programs such as bible study and services are attended on a regular basis and the number of inmates participating has nearly doubled. The religious program is coordinated by Rev. Jackson who is a volunteer and is assisted by three other volunteers who are ordained ministers. Our drug and alcohol awareness and prevention program has developed from a once a week program to three days a week with an average of six inmates participating in each program at any given time.

As part of the jail's management philosophy we feel productive inmates present less problems, develop self esteem, and in some way repay the community for the burden of having to care for them during their stay at the jail. With this, many inmates that meet a classification standard of being non-violent and are not likely to be a risk of escape are utilized in work details. Inmates in the facility are involved in laundry services, food preparation, washing all food service items, floor and building maintenance, mowing grass and pulling weeds at the police station and washing police cars. This

inmate work program has provided approximately 5,200 man hours of inmate labor. In addition to this work program, inmates are also involved in a litter and community clean up program. With this program inmates are escorted into our community by a corrections officer and pick up litter, clean underpasses, shovel snow at school cross walks, plant trees and flowers in our parks and assist other city agencies with suitable projects.

These inmates have also worked in cooperation with our city Parks Department in forestry work conducting a major cleanup operation at the park behind our police department and have worked on other forestry projects in parks throughout the city.

Within our jail facility, the staff utilizes some state of the art technology. Our security system is computerized which controls the opening and closing of all jail doors. It also monitors all intercom stations so communications throughout the jail are possible along with audio surveillance of inmates. 36 camera locations are also monitored and recorded. The security system provides the ability to control all electric and water flow to each of the five housing areas. All of our inmate bookings and inmate tracking is achieved through the use of the in-house computer system. This portion of the existing computer system was placed into use when the jail opened. This system not only tracks inmates in the correctional setting, it also provides investigators within the police department with added information and alerts them to suspects in other cases who are incarcerated in our facility. In addition, this system tracks court dates, sentences, release dates and automatically provides daily print outs for all these activities. All of the required documentation and logs are also incorporated into this computer system making the operations of the jail nearly paperless. This system provides for an accurate and authentic record of all activities within the jail. Our fingerprinting is conducted on the Automated Fingerprint Identification System. This system incorporates the most current technology in fingerprinting by utilizing live scanning technology and automatically transmits these prints to the FBI and BCI. This system is a time saver and provides for a much higher quality of fingerprint, making this process more efficient than the traditional inking process.

The jail has had a very productive eight months. From the time of opening, we have renovated the kitchen facility with a convection oven, ice machine and a soup kettle. The cost of this equipment was near \$15,000.00 and was absorbed by ARAMARK Food Service, who is our contracted provider. In addition to the upgrade to our kitchen facility, ARAMARK agreed to sign the equipment over to the city in five years and immediately reduced the price per meal to \$1.895 from \$2.35. This alone has a projected savings of \$23,914.00 per year.

Starting in August, we entered into a contract leasing bed space to the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Office. Since that time we have leased out 1,467 bed days for a total income of \$91,687.50. In addition to leasing with Cuyahoga County we entered into a contract with Sheffield Village. The village utilized 38 bed days for an income to the city of \$2,660.00. The leasing program utilizes available bed space within our facility. At no time have we ever refused a prisoner arrested by our patrol or detective divisions. With this program we are maximizing the efficiency of our facility and make full use of the correctional staff and building.

Other areas that provide revenues back to the city are the inmate phones and work release fees. With the inmate phones we receive 30% of the total billings generated by inmate usage and have produced \$13,686.76 in revenues. The work release program allows for inmates authorized by the courts to go to their regular jobs and report back to the jail when not working. These inmates are charged a nominal fee to compensate for their housing costs while in the care of the jail. This program has generated \$7,599.37.

Below is an income summary of the above program areas which incorporates the eight months of jail operations.

In addition to the above revenues, the jail maintains an inmate commissary program by which the inmates are required, if not indigent, to purchase all of their personal hygiene products and snacks. This helps ease the burden of inmate costs otherwise provided by the jail. The jail also receives 5% of the profits generated by this program. The proceeds derived from the commissary can only be utilized for inmate programs or indigent inmates. We also have an inmate medical co-pay program. The inmates are required to share in the cost of their medical treatment. This will keep basic medical cost down. Our philosophy is, if the inmates have to pay they will make wiser choices and not abuse these services. Very few inmates choose to see medical staff because of the co-pay and inmates who have medical insurance are required to make use of it.

In order to enhance the security during arraignment proceedings, the Elyria City Jail conducted all arraignments with Elyria Municipal Court via a video arraignment process. Audio and video equipment in the jail and at the court allow arraignments to take place electronically without the inmate having to leave the secure jail facility. As a result of the corrections staff being able to handle the video arraignments, police officers are available to handle other duties.

In review of the past eight months the transition into the new jail has gone smoothly. The jail has been involved in many innovative programs and have made full use of all of its resources. The jail division has received the full support of the police department's members and administration. In addition, we have experienced outstanding cooperation with the Municipal Court and Clerk Of Courts Office making for an outstanding municipal correctional facility.

Services - Training

In 1998 various members of the Elyria Police Department received training in numerous law enforcement related subjects. This training was accomplished through the use of outside schools and seminars and the following in-service training classes:

The Elyria Police Department subscribes to the Law Enforcement Television Network. Officers are encouraged to view specifically assigned subjects. There are five (5) viewing monitors placed throughout the police department. There is also a recording monitor in the Patrol O.I.C.'s office and in the Roll Call Room to tape specific programs for viewing on the shifts during briefing training.

During 1998, there were a total of 27,311 hours of training provided to the officers, dispatchers and civilian personnel within the Elyria Police Department at a cost of \$54,926.00. The following is a breakdown of the distribution of this training and cost by Departmental Unit:

Services - D.A.R.E.

In 1983 Chief Daryl Gates of the Los Angeles Police Department realized that law enforcement can only reduce the supply, not the demand for drugs in our nation's schools. Chief Gates subsequently directed his staff to work with the Los Angeles Unified School District on the development of an effective substance abuse prevention curriculum. The result was project D.A.R.E., an acronym for Drug Abuse Resistance Education.

The Attorney General for the State of Ohio, the Ohio Association of Police, and the Ohio Department of Education have combined resources to bring D.A.R.E. to Ohio to prevent drug abuse by school age youth.

D.A.R.E. is a kindergarten through eighth grade curriculum, with a primary emphasis in the fifth and sixth grades, just before the children are most likely to begin experimenting with drugs or alcohol. The lessons focus on techniques for resisting peer pressure, making decisions and problem solving; students are also challenged to consider the consequences for their actions and to consider healthy alternatives to drug use.

In November of 1990, the Elyria Police Department made a commitment to D.A.R.E. and the Elyria City School System by having Officer Rick Valentik complete 40 hours of D.A.R.E. training. Officer Valentik presented the first D.A.R.E. class in the Elyria City Schools in November of 1990 and March of 1991. Beginning in March, 1991 until June, 1991, D.A.R.E. was presented to six Elyria schools and two parochial schools.

Officer Rick Valentik presented the D.A.R.E. curriculum until May of 1993 when Officer George E. Wakeman was assigned to the position. He was trained as a D.A.R.E. officer in 1993 and conducted classes in eight public schools and two parochial schools. In April of 1994, Officer Bob Brandal was trained as a second D.A.R.E. officer and began teaching in September of 1994. In the fall of 1996, Officer Wandra Ward was trained as a third D.A.R.E. officer and began teaching in January of 1997.

During the 1997-98 school year, the D.A.R.E. curriculum was presented to 941 students in 19 public, parochial and private schools within the City of Elyria. Officers George Wakeman and Bob Brandal were also trained to teach in the junior high schools and presented the program to 647 junior high school students during the 1997-1998 school year.

The D.A.R.E. program consistently receives excellent reviews from the school system and from the community. Both officers are commended for their dedication to the job and for their commitment to the youth of our community.

The D.A.R.E. program for the 1997-1998 school year was made possible by the funding provided with the passage of the police levy by the citizens of Elyria and a grant from the Ohio Attorney General's Office. Their support and assistance is vital and has made this improvement in police services possible.

Services - Safety-Town

Safety-Town is a cooperative effort of the City of Elyria, the Elyria Kiwanis Club, and the Fraternal Order of Police Associates.

465 children received instruction during the 1998 Safety-Town Program.

There were 105 student volunteers who donated hours as Safety-Town instructors.

The 1998 Safety-Town was a 5 week program with one week of intensive instruction for each class.

Narcotics Unit Activities in 1998

In 1998 the Narcotics Unit of the Elyria Police Department continued its aggressive investigation into all levels of drug trafficking in our community. The Elyria Police Narcotics Unit also conducted investigations involving prostitution and gambling. As a result of these investigations, many offenders were entered into the justice system.

In January of 1998, the Narcotics Unit assisted the Lorain Police Department in the investigation of persons operating illegal Las Vegas Nights in the City of Lorain. Two Elyria officers, posing as gamblers, entered the facility along with agents of the Ohio Attorney General's Office and identified the illegal activities and those responsible for those activities.

There was an investigation into a subject operating a prostitution ring in Cuyahoga County that was being administered from a location within Elyria. The investigation led to a search warrant in October of 1998. The subject of the investigation is pending indictment. The Elyria Police Department's Narcotics Unit participated with other local area law enforcement agencies in a joint investigation into gambling activities in Lorain County. Several "bookies" in Elyria and Lorain were identified and arrested. One Westlake resident and several Lorain residents have been indicted and two Elyria residents are pending indictment in relation to this investigation.

During 1998 there were two residences in Elyria that, as a result of reported drug activity, were identified as public nuisances. In October of 1998, 159 Brace Avenue was the subject of an investigation that culminated with a search warrant being served and abatements sought through the Lorain County Court of Common Pleas. In November of 1998, an investigation into activities at 121 Tannery Street had similar results.

A combined effort between the Elyria Police Narcotics Unit and the Elyria Police Neighborhood Impact Unit was initiated in the City's high drug trafficking areas throughout the latter part of 1998. The activities specifically targeted the buyers of drugs and non-residents of those areas. As a result of these activities, there were many subjects arrested on drug related charges, traffic related charges, and outstanding warrants.

The Narcotics Unit accomplished the following in 1998:

* Some cases have been reduced or dismissed in return for the suspect's cooperation into further drug investigations. Other remain as open investigations.

The Narcotics Unit's successes have been the direct result of a cooperative effort of the Narcotics Unit, the Neighborhood Impact Unit, the Investigative Bureau and the Patrol Division of the Elyria Police Department. This cooperation, along with the professional relationship maintained with other investigative agencies, has allowed the Narcotics Unit to be a productive tool in the City of Elyria. Through the cooperative efforts of the Elyria Police Department, Elyria city officials and the citizens of our community, the Elyria Police Department's Narcotics Unit will continue to set and reach its goals.

Community Oriented Policing (COPS)

In 1998 there were two areas of the community that served as target neighborhoods for the Community Oriented Policing programs. Those neighborhoods were the Wilkes Villa complex and the Westway Gardens area. These areas had officers assigned to them on a full-time basis and received outside funding in the form of State and Federal Grants to help support the programs. The officers assigned did an excellent job of organizing the citizens in those areas as a cooperative effort with the police department and other city services

Wilkes Villa

During 1998, two officers were assigned full time to the Wilkes Villa complex. In addition to normal patrol activities, the officers were involved in the following activities:

1. An after school homework program was started for neighborhood children.
2. Meetings were held with neighborhood church groups and security provided for their activities.
3. A program for meeting with new residents within the complex was established.
4. Door-to-door interviews and surveys were conducted to address neighborhood problems.
5. Safety training was provided to Home care workers who would be treating neighborhood residents.
6. Worked with the children of the complex (cook-outs, worked on sporting skills, etc.)
7. Officers purchased sporting equipment for use by residents of the complex.
8. Officers conducted a "Photo Day" during which computer generated photographs of neighborhood children were provided to the parents for identification purposes.
9. Officers held weekly meetings with the management of the complex to address problems and concerns of the residents in the area.

2. The COPS Officer was involved in a spring Easter Egg Hunt for the children of the neighborhood.
3. The COPS Officer was involved with the Boy Scouts in the area and activities included a Klondike Derby and a trip to Gund Arena to see the Harlem Globe Trotters play.
4. A Three-on-Three Basketball Tournament was held in conjunction with the Pride Day clean-up activities.
5. The COPS Officer organized a fall bicycle registration drive.
6. The COPS Officer organized the printing and distribution of Halloween Safety pamphlets.
7. At Christmas time, the COPS Officer was involved in a program which allowed Christmas lights and presents to be given to those in need. A Christmas party for neighborhood children was also held.
